School Dedication Attracts Large Crowd

KAUFMAN PRESENTS \$ 2,000 CHECK TO SCHOOL BOARD

On Sunday November 5th, an estimated 600 guests were on hand for the dedication of the new Woodridge school building.

The dedication program was opened with an invocation given by the Reverend John Swanson, Pastor of the Prince of Peace Lutheran Church, followed by a salute to the Flag by the audience.

The program began with an exchange of presentations between Don Miller, the school board president, and Jack Kaufman, Vice president of Surety Builders. Miller presented Kaufman with a plaque in recognition of Surety Builders contribution of land and money to the school district. After an acknowledgement, Kaufman presented Miller with a check for two thousand dollars. Miller expressed the district's thanks in accepting the check.

This \$2000 check represents \$200 per home for the 401 st through the 410 th home built in Woodridge. When making the original donation of land and \$50,000 to the school district, Surety Builders additionally agreed to donate \$200 per home after construction of the first 400 homes.

Dr. Glenn E. Pickrel, Superintendent of Downers Grove schools, was introduced as guest speaker by school board member Ned Hill. Mr. Pickrel spoke on the subject of problem children and the causes of their problems.

Board President Miller presented a gold key to Mrs. Elizabeth Crane, Superintendent-Principal of District #68.

BOARD DISMISSES BARN COMMITTEE

At the November meeting of the village board President Wm. Roberts, in commenting on the recent article in the WNR on the Citizens Committee for removal of the village barn, said this committee is dismissed "as far as the board is concerned."

President Roberts, in explaining his action said, "we (the village board) have investigated the availability of land and the cost involved and Mr. Werch has communicated this information to the committee, Mr. Jayne and Mr. McGrath have attended all their meetings, as private citizens. This committee has never approached the village board since its appointment and has made no recommendations."

As stated in the October 19 issue of WNR, Mrs. Lois Demmin, secretary of the Citizens Committee, has stated, "the committee has received no assurance from either the village board or the builder that it (village barn) would come down." Mrs. Demmin had further stated at that time that the Citizens Committee would rest until definite word was received.

The Citizens Committee was formed when a group of residents living in the area of the village barn, approached the village board, asking for its removal. The group stated at that time, that the builder had assured them that this structure would come down when the builder had no further use for storing his materials in it. It is being used to house fire and police vehicles. The committee stated the building was an "eyesore" and detracted from property values.

Since that time long sheds, which were attached to the rear of the building, were removed, with approval of the village board. The village barn area occupies three lots on Crabtree. The ground area has been cleaned, graded and seeded, at the village board's request.

BIDS FOR OVERHEAD DOORS

At this time village trustee Syle Jayne of the public protection committee, in conjunction with the Fire Department is accepting bids for new overhead doors for the fire department portion of the building. In addition to housing fire and police vehicles the village barn will house the newly acquired snow plow.

In commenting on the dismissal of the Citizens Committee, President Roberts said, "I publicly condemn what action they (the Citizens Committee) have taken----The committee is dismissed as far as the board is concerned!" and has no further function in this community.

Contracts To Be Awarded For New Lutheran Church

Contracts are expected to be awarded next week for construction of a new building announced by the Board of Trustees of Trinity Lutheran Church.

The one level sanctuary with basement will seat 232 persons and 28 more in the choir balcony. 215 students will be accommodated in eight classrooms in the basement.

The Reverend Don Ehlers was installed as Trinity's pastor in June 1960, two months after the first worship service was held.

The land for the building site was acquired in February 1961. The five and 1/2 acre site is located on Highway 53 South of Maple Avenue.

The firm of Cooley & Borre, architects, was engaged to design and submit preliminary plans for a first unit. These plans call for work to begin in December with completion late in the Spring. Services are presently being held in the Main Street School at 8:00 and 10:00 a.m. Sunday School begins at 9:15 a.m.

SUBDIVISION CONTROL ORDINANCE A POSSIBILITY BY JANUARY

"The Woodridge sub-division control ordinance may be ready in January of 1962", according to village president Roberts.

At the November board meeting, Al Zettler, 2653 Crabtree, a member of the audience, questioned the board concerning a zoning ordinance which Woodridge does not have at present. President Roberts explained that in order to have the most complete and up to date sub-division control ordinance, the village attorney's office was continuing work on incorporating the very latest information in the recently released municipal code. Zettler questioned if it "... would not be more beneficial to establish even partial protection for the residents?"

Robert H. Murphy was appointed as Trustee at the November 2nd Village Board meeting. Murphy will fill the vacancy created by Lewis Benckendorfs resignation in September. This un-expired term is to run until April 1963.

Murphy attended both Roosevelt and DePaul University, Majoring in business administration. He has been employed by United Wallpaper Co. for four years as assistant sale manager.

In addition to membership in the W. H. O. A., he is a co-chairman on the Citizens Advisory Council.

Interior decorating is one of Murphy's main hobbies which he shares with his wife.

Murphy has been appointed purchasing agent for the Village to fill a vacancy created by Bob Seiverts' resignation.

Murphy 38 and his wife Eleanor have lived at 7620 Catalpa for the past 15 months. They have two children, Kurt 9 and Sally 1 and a half years old.

Gene O'Connell Appointed New Precinct Committeeman

Gene O'Connell, 2936 Westridge, was recently appointed Republican precinct committeeman for the newly created precinct #18 of Lisle Township.

He will serve until the primary elections in April of 1962.

Easement Request Deferred

Action on a letter dated Oct. 17, written to the village board by Surety Development Corp. has been deferred until the next regular meeting.

In the letter a request was made by the developer to reduce the easements on lots 514 and 515 ten feet each. This would leave a total of ten feet which the developer feels is sufficient for drainage and utilities. The lots in question are located on the south side of Crabtree between Deerfield and Catalpa.

President Roberts said he thought that this should be referred to the Plan Commission before any action is taken.

No Halloween Vandalism

President Wm. Roberts stated at the November board meeting that "no reports of vandalism or rowdiness in the village were reported to the Woodridge Police Department on Halloween. However one call was received from outside the village, this was about a broken window."

Roberts said this was due to the wonderful cooperation of everyone. "The VFW, Roberts said, did a wonderful job; the children are to be commended also."

Seivert Resigns As Village Purchasing Agent

At the Nov. 2 Village Board Meeting a letter was read tendering Robert Seivert's resignation as Purchasing Agent.

The resignation was accepted unanimously by the board.

Seivert has served as purchasing agent for the Village since early 1960.

WAA and Gra-y Pledge Mutual Assistance

On October 30 the Woodridge Athletic Association board of directors met with two officials of the Downers Grove YMCA. Present were Len Bennett, program committee chairman and Will Mason, program secretary.

Mason explained their program and goals for Woodridge and offered to help the WAA in any way they could.

As a result of this meeting the WAA feels that the Gra-Y movement will not conflict with the present WAA program and has received unanimous approval from the board, along with a pledge of assistance, according to a WAA spokesman.

Through the assistance of Jack Collins the WAA recently purchased a 30 watt amplifier and two loud speakers. These are being used for the teen dances and will be available for other WAA undertakings. Kopka TV, of Downers Grove completely overhauled the unit and donated a microphone free of charge to the WAA.

Police Dance Proceeds Pay For Radio

Sergeant Ed Arndt, treasurer of the Police Association, reported that the proceeds from the dance held Oct. 28, totaled \$909.39. After expenses for the dance had been paid, the Association realized \$688.97.

The Association has completed payment on the two-way radio that was purchased with monies realized from the 1960 dance.

At the Nov. 2, meeting of the village board, Sergeant Russo, president of the Police Association, presented the two-way radio to the village in the name of the Association. The Village Board accepted the radio and expressed their gratitude to the police department for obtaining this equipment.

Sergeant Arndt further stated that the remainder of the money from the Oct. 28 dance will be used by the Association for equipment.

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Instruction For Judges

October 21

Police Magistrate Arthur M. Berg head 18 cases. Eight were stop sign violations, two were speeding violations, three cases were dismissed and five cases were continued until Nov. 4.

He collected a total of \$46 in fines and \$50 in court costs.

November 4

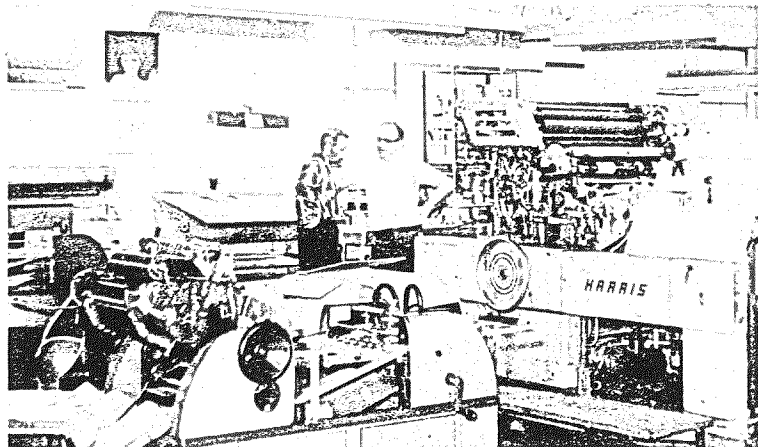
One of the first steps in the production of the paper is the photography of the artwork. Pictured above is the off-set preparatory supervisor, Vern Lucius.



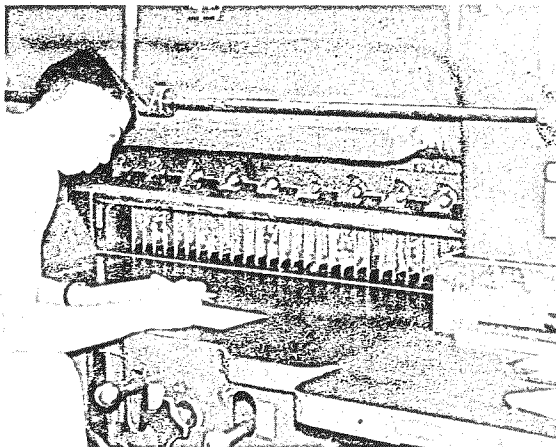

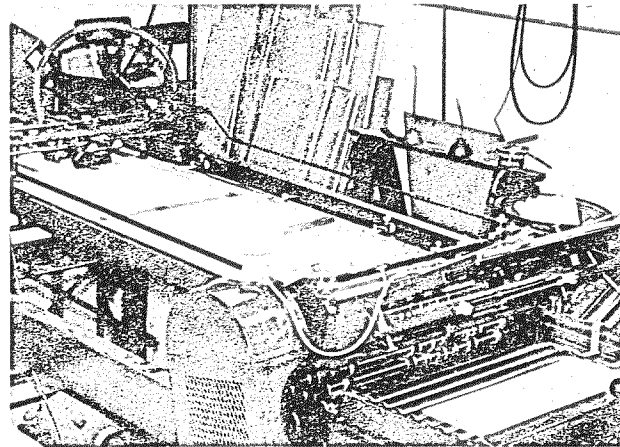

Scouts Plan Paper Drive

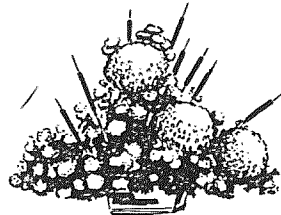
